

Renovations to the Mansion's Front Porch

In November, Shawn Connor of Connor Artistry began the HSDC's latest Mansion renovation project, replacing the flooring, foundation, and pillars on the northwest half of the front porch. Shawn removed the old floor and rotten joists and built a new foundation. He then added new joists, floor boards, and pillars. Everything was completed, except for the final coat of paint on the new pillars, in time for Deck the Halls.

This is the second major restoration undertaking in the Mansion for Connor Artistry and the third project to date for the HSDC. Shawn and his assistant Jared reinforced the support structure of the first floor of the Mansion in January 2009 and put the

The following poem by Jackson Taylor was recited to the public for the first time at the beginning of the "Blue Orchard Evening" at the Midtown Scholar on November 11, 2010. Many of those in attendance asked for a copy of the poem and he was kind enough to provide it to us for publication.

Inherent Appetite

I come from a family of good cooks.

Men and women who stand to braise in watch,
Or roll and crimp, grease cakepans side by side,
Plaid dishtowels flung o'er shoulders with joy.
Though their backs grow tired, sure hands warm their work,
And I'm too young to know one day we'll long,

Yes, long for food, those oak tables stretched long. Those home-grown childhood meals--who cares who cooks? They want to provide--youth expects such work: Kitchen horseplay, licking battered spoons, mindful in watch, Blowing and biting hot flaked treats of joy, Apple dumplings browned in bake side by side,

Raspberry pie--black juice running plateside,
Roast rabbit spiked with dry rosemary, longGrain wild rice, that sauce piqued with pepper's joy,
Such pleasures of the palate. Such good cooks;
Testing it all, eyes minding each timed watch,
Garden to oven. We eat and take seconds of their work.

Their work--well eaten! Oh, such handiwork! Children blanketed and warm side by side, Napping through clean-up, scoured pots, the swatch Of rag mopping the floor, those days grown long With ever daily duty--worn-out cooks-- Practiced, seasoned, storing leftover's joy.

I guess they were joyous? Meals of joy?
Spry elders happy in their daily work?
But as they age we must replace these cooks,
Learn ourselves to baste, whip, cut through boneside,
Dress pheasants, pour gravy--our nights stretched long;
Is this the last meal we've all blessed in watch?

Lives grow busier, meals go skipped, whose to watch? Keep track of time? Crush the old sage with joy? Death steals some recipes, blue-cursive long-Hand fades, gardens go begging, race to work, Eat on the run, pass the graves side by side: Here lies a family of once good cooks.

And who knew all these tasks would fall to you?

The preservation of the fruit, longing now for youth,

And those free meals served by cooks,

Who stood in watch at tableside as we devoured their dreams.
