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From the Director's Desk ...

Dear Friends of Dauphin County History,

This is an exciting time to celebrate the history of Harrisburg and Dauphin County. One hundred fifty years ago, Harrisburg was well on its way to becoming the major troop training and supply distribution point for the Union Army, and Dauphin County native Simon Cameron was serving as U.S. Secretary of War. In March of 1861, the leading families of Harrisburg mourned the loss of one of their own, the Reverend Beverly Waugh, and the institution he had established, the Pennsylvania Female College. The college had been housed in the John Harris Mansion and when it closed, College Trustee Simon Cameron bought the mansion. Over the next several years, he

transformed it into the National Landmark Victorian structure and community asset that survives to this day.

The mansion has always been the setting for programs, exhibits and events. The next four years will see increased activity as we commemorate a period of great significance in our country's history in a landmark home with a period of greatest significance to match.

Of course, we'll take a few detours into other eras, as we did on this past 4th of July and in our current exhibit on the native Americans of our region. However, many of our programs will be designed to help us celebrate and commemorate the lives of those who made history in our backyard and the nation 150 years ago today. We hope you will join us this fall.

A New Independence Day Tradition

On July 4th, the Rev. David Biser (aka John Harris Jr.) and the Friends of the Harris-Cameron Mansion relived a significant moment in national and local history; the day in July 1776 when John Harris called the citizens of Harris Ferry together and read the Declaration of Independence to the assembled crowd from the front porch of his mansion. On this July 4th, John Harris Jr. was joined by several Revolutionary War era figures, including his daughter, Mary Harris, several citizens of the Harris Ferry region and a surprise guest, Ben Franklin, who was passing through the area and stopped in to visit with Mr. Harris for the day. The readings were on the hour from 10:00am to 2:00pm and were covered by all four television stations and the *Patriot-News*. Over one hundred people attended the readings and over half of the attendees took advantage of special holiday rates

to tour the Mansion.

Mark your calendars for July 4th, 2012 and plan to join John Harris Jr. and Friends next year to celebrate the importance of July 4th in our history at the Mansion.

HSDC to Host Free Civil War Lyceum

On Sunday, September 4th, the Historical Society will revive a mid-nineteenth century tradition and host a free "Lyceum" from 1:00-4:00pm at the Mansion. The Lyceum movement began in the United States in the 1820s as a form of adult education popular and was the precursor of the post-war Chautauqua movement. The Lyceum, a part of

Chautauqua movement. The Lyceum, a part of Dauphin County's ongoing commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, will feature family entertainment and presentations by historians and authors Dr. Michael Barton and Todd Mealy.

History Teller David Shuey will reenact the experiences of John Singleton Mosby during the Civil War complete with horse. Musical entertainment will be provided by the Susquehanna Travellers, who perform the music of the Civil War era.

Refreshments prepared using Civil War period recipes will be served.

Fall Bus Trip to Historic Bucks County

Historic sites in scenic Bucks County are the itinerary for HSDC's fall bus trip, which includes visits to Fonthill, the Mercer Museum, and the Pearl S. Buck House. Fonthill was the home of Henry Chapman Mercer, archaeologist, anthropologist, ceramist, and antiquarian, and served as the show-place for his collection of Moravian tiles. The Mercer Museum is another legacy of Henry Chapman Mercer. The six story concrete castle was built in 1916 to house Mercer's extensive collection of handmade items which had become obsolete in the machine age. The third stop on the tour is Green Hills Farm, better known as the Pearl S. Buck House. The noted author purchased the farm in 1933 and it was her home until her death in 1973.

The tour itinerary is based on suggestions submitted by participants in prior bus tours.

The 29 passenger bus will depart from the Weis store in Hampden Township at 7:15 am on Thursday October 13, 2011 and will arrive back at approximately 6:30 pm. Lunch will be at the Mercer Museum restaurant

She meant so much to us that we continued to list and consider her one of our own long after her departure.

Program Series to Highlight the Contributions of Women of Color

The often unheralded contributions of women of color to our nation and its history will be celebrated through a series of programs entitled *Women of Emancipation: Surviving the Past—Strengthening the Future.* The series consists of four programs spanning the period from the Underground Railroad through the mid-twentieth century to be held in the fall of 2011 and throughout 2012. The first program, sponsored by HERCO, will focus on the female slave experience and include a reenactment of the life of Jane Marie Chester, escaped slave, Harrisburg businesswoman and mother of T. Morris Chester. The program will also include musical performances and poetry readings. The program will take place on Sunday November 20 from 1:30-3:30 pm and include a light buffet "tea style" lunch.

HSDC is proud to serve on the planning committee for the series along with representatives from Women Connect, the PA DCED Office of Cultural and Heritage Programs, the YWCA of Greater Harrisburg, the Foundation for Enhancing Communities, the City of Harrisburg and the Dauphin County Diversity Taskforce.
